FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

The trustees are pleased to present their report, together with the financial statements of the charity, for the twelve months ended 31st March 2014.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, applicable law and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in 2005.

Directors and trustees

The directors of the charitable company Greenhouse Schools Project Limited (the charity or "Greenhouse") are its trustees for the purposes of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as "the trustees".

None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. Michael de Giorgio is a member of the company and guarantees to contribute $\pounds 1$ in the event of a winding up.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

Greenhouse is a company limited by guarantee by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 26th November 2002 and amended by special resolution on 2nd October 2007 and since on 11th June 2014 updating the requirement of the trustees to sign off payments. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission. The relevant registration numbers are charity number 1098744 and company number 4600790.

Appointment of trustees

At each Annual General Meeting, one-third of the existing trustees retire by rotation but they may offer themselves for re-election. No person other than a trustee retiring by rotation shall be appointed a trustee unless he is recommended by the other trustees or proposed by a member in accordance with the Articles of Association. There must be at least two trustees but the maximum number is unlimited. When considering the appointment of new trustees, the board has regard to the requirement for any specialist skills or characteristics needed, together with general enthusiasm for the work of Greenhouse.

Trustee induction and training

Prior to their appointment, trustees are expected to undergo a period of familiarisation with the charity's activities. This will include receiving background information and they are encouraged to visit the programmes, see operations first hand and meet the key personnel as well as the other trustees.

There is a formal budget available for training, including attending external courses relevant to trustees, and all trustees are routinely invited to join Greenhouse's in-house training days. Regular visits to the programmes are arranged to enable trustees to keep up-to-date with what is happening at our participating schools and community clubs.

Organisation

The board of trustees administers the charity. The board meets regularly throughout the year. All strategic development decisions are taken by the trustees.

Three sub-committees also meet regularly throughout the year. The Fundraising Committee, the Operations Committee and the Finance, Audit and Risk Committee each comprise trustees and relevant members of the senior management team. The Chair of each Committee reports back to full trustee meetings. We also have an Editorial committee which meets on an ad hoc basis to provide advice and guidance to staff on general communications and publications.

Whilst day to day decisions are delegated to senior employees, Michael de Giorgio, a founder trustee, works for the charity full-time on a voluntary basis in the capacity of Chief Executive Officer; hence, he is an important and valuable link to the trustees on an ongoing basis.

Risk management

The trustees have adopted a risk management strategy which comprises:

- a risk register to review the risks the charity may face;
- review of key risk indicators (KRIs) to aid risk mitigation; and
- systems and procedures designed to minimise the impact on the charity should those risks materialise.

The risk register is regularly reviewed by the Finance, Audit and Risk Committee and the main board of trustees.

Income recognition policy

All income is recognised upon receipt except where its use is wholly or partially restricted beyond or exceeding a twelve month period by the donor, in which case the relevant proportion will be treated as deferred income.

Greenhouse has received a major donation to fund a number of schools in East London for at least three years. As the project started in September 2011, we have recognised 31 months of income (31/36ths of the donation) relating to the project in 2011-12, 2012-13 & 2013-14 and will recognise the remainder equally over the next five months.

Reserves policy

Greenhouse aims to retain unrestricted funds of between three to six months of expected operating expenditure for the following year to ensure that we can meet our long term commitments to the participants, their schools, community clubs and other partners.

The charity has £1,595,950 (2013: £2,229,948) unrestricted funds, representing nearly four months of the planned £4.9 million expenditure in 2014-15.

Objectives and activities

The objects of the charity, as set out in the Memorandum of Association, are to improve the conditions of life of children and young people in London who are deprived or disadvantaged or who do not ordinarily have access to sports and arts facilities by the provision of sports and arts programmes.

As such, Greenhouse aims to transform young people's lives by engaging them in sport, especially targeting those who may not otherwise have access to such opportunities.

Greenhouse aims to develop social, thinking, emotional and physical skills for young people in London's most disadvantaged communities through high quality, intensive sports programmes delivered by inspirational coaches, enabling them to take a positive STEP forward in life.

Programmes that Greenhouse is currently running are as follows:

- Basketball: Greenhouse operates 11 school programmes plus the Greenhouse Pioneers community club, which is based in central London with satellite training centres in South and East London. 1659 participants have attended at least 1 session in the year with 719 participants averaging 1+ hr per week.
- Football: Greenhouse London Football Club continued to be very popular, with over 400 registered members during the 2013-14 season; the club caters for 8-year olds ranging up to young adults, in South London. We also run a school football programme at Pimlico Academy. 1506 participants have attended at least 1 session in the year with 430 participants averaging 1+ hr per week.

- Judo: There is one full time school programme. The programme continues to achieve impressive results, producing 6 medallists at the 2013 British Schools Championships. 159 participants have attended at least 1 session in the year with 45 participants averaging 1+ hr per week.
- SEN Multisports: Greenhouse operates 9 full-time programmes at Special Educational Needs (SEN) schools and 1 weekend, fully inclusive SEN swimming club. Our mainstream school programmes also target "harder to reach" young people by working with SEN Coordinators and Learning Support Units. 952 participants have attended at least 1 session in the year with 401 participants averaging 1+ hr per week.
- Table tennis: We currently run 10 full time school programmes, including two that also run community club sessions. Supporters include the English Table Tennis Association (ETTA) and the Mayor's Fund for London. 1,247 participants have attended at least 1 session in the year with 417 participants averaging 1+ hr per week.
- Volleyball. In 2013-14 Greenhouse continued its highly successful full time school programme in South London. 98 participants have attended at least 1 session in the year with 47 participants averaging 1+ hr per week.
- Tennis: Greenhouse continued to operate two full time school programmes in East London with support and funding from the Tennis Foundation. 269 participants have attended at least 1 session in the year with 61 participants averaging 1+ hr per week.
- Coach Core: Thanks to the generous support of The Royal Foundation, Greenhouse is completing an apprenticeship programme in sports coaching for around 20 participants. In addition to earning sport specific and apprenticeship qualification, the young people involved have gained invaluable experience and mentoring throughout the two year programme. The Royal Foundation have continued to support Greenhouse to deliver the Coach Core programme. The second cohort for a programme to be delivered over 1 year will commence September 2014.
- Volunteering: We are supported by volunteers across all areas of the charity's work and are very grateful for their knowledge, experience and enthusiasm. Their roles vary from long term regular coaching and mentoring positions to ad hoc support on projects and events. During the last financial year, just under 200 volunteers supported the charity through donation of their time and talent.

Greenhouse continued the White City Estate drama club in West London over 2013-14. 47 participants attended at least 1 session in the year with 18 participants averaging 1+ hr per week. Greenhouse has made the strategic decision to focus on sports programmes and hence not to deliver Performing Arts programmes. The drama club has reconstituted itself as a community interest company White City Theatre Project, with the coaches transferring to it.

Financial review

During the period, the charity received gross income of £4,949,182 (2013: £3,539,777), of which £4,069,024 (2013: £2,432,437) was restricted. £3,069,024 (2013: £2,432,437) of this was for operations and £1,000,000 (2013: £nil) was capital for building the table tennis centre.

Restricted income comprises £702,897 (2013: £599,791) contributions from participating schools and £3,366,127 (2013: £1,832,646) restricted donations.

The costs of the charity's programmes in the period were £3,616,590 (2013: £3,213,124).

Greenhouse started the period with net assets of £4,922,473 (2013: £4,931,686) and carries forward £5,874,625, of which £4,278,675 (2013: £2,692,525) is restricted in use with £1,278,675 (2013: £692,525) for operating programmes and £3,000,000 (2013: £2,000,000) for funding the capital cost of building a facility.

Investment powers and policy

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to invest at the discretion of the trustees. It is the trustees' policy to invest surplus funds on a conservative basis.

Plans for future periods

In 2014-15 Greenhouse intends to continue to implement the social, thinking, emotional and physical (STEP) skills methodology in schools with which it works and to grow mainstream school programmes it provides in line with the business plan.

Public Benefit Statement

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit 'Charities and Public Benefit'.

Greenhouse's charitable purpose is enshrined in its objects to "improve the conditions of life of children and young people in the United Kingdom (from disadvantaged communities) who do not ordinarily have access to sports and arts facilities" by providing high-quality sport and performing arts programmes.

The trustees ensure that this purpose is carried out for the public benefit by reviewing our programmes to ensure they are meeting our aims as outlined in the section on Objectives and Activities. They also review annual evaluation reporting to assess the impact of Greenhouse programmes on our participants' engagement with their education, their involvement in the community, and their overall health and well-being.

Participation in Greenhouse programmes is open to all pupils of our participating schools and membership of our clubs is open to those who both fall into the relevant age categories and who show a commitment to engaging in the relevant activity.

The trustees have concluded that the aims of the organisation continue to be charitable, that the aims and the work done give identifiable benefits to our participants, that the benefits are in the public interest, are not unreasonably restricted in any way and that there is no detriment or harm arising from the aims and activities.

Disclosure of information to the auditors

Each of the trustees has confirmed that there is no material information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify any such relevant information and to establish that the auditors are aware of such information.

Auditors

In accordance with section 485 of the Companies Act 2006, a resolution will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting that HW Fisher & Company be re-appointed as auditors to the charity for the ensuing year

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Incoming resources

Income has been recognised gross on the basis of entitlement, certainty and measurement.

Donations, legacies and other forms of voluntary income are recognised as incoming resources when receivable, except insofar as they are incapable of financial measurement.

Grants are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial activities in the year in which they are receivable or any requirement imposed on the grant is fulfilled.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis, inclusive of value added tax.

Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, in particular grant funding and the costs of maintaining the charity's profile within the sector.

Expenditure relating to sports and arts programmes are those elements of expenditure directly incurred in performing these activities.

Governance costs include those costs incurred in the governance of the charity's assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

33% straight line

Items less than £300 are usually expensed, as is most sports equipment.

1.5 Investments

Current asset investments are term deposits held with the bank for a period of six months or more.

1.6 Accumulated funds

Unrestricted funds are general funds that are available for the use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.
